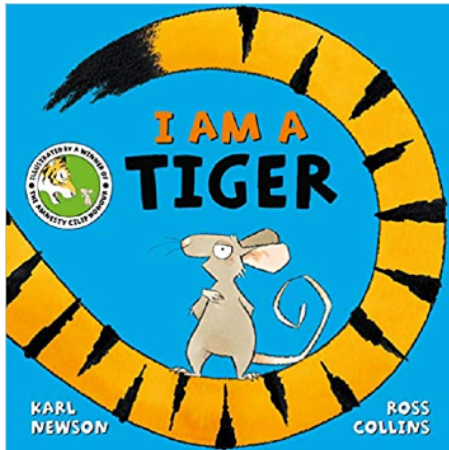

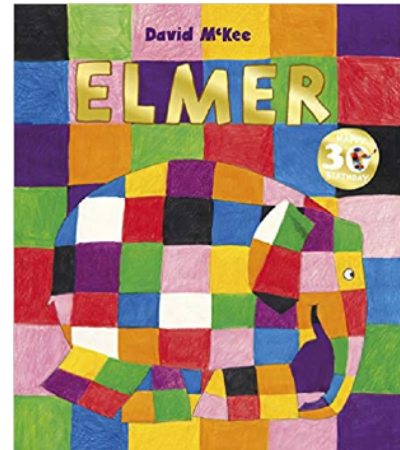
I Am A Tiger by Karl Newson

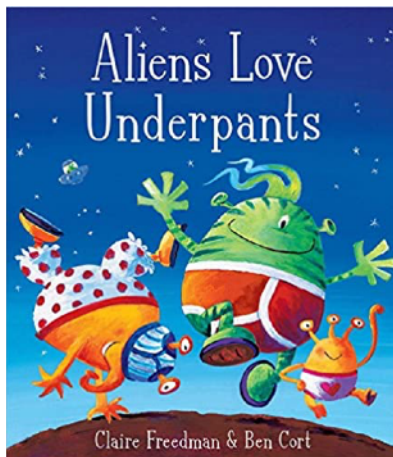
Elmer by David McKee

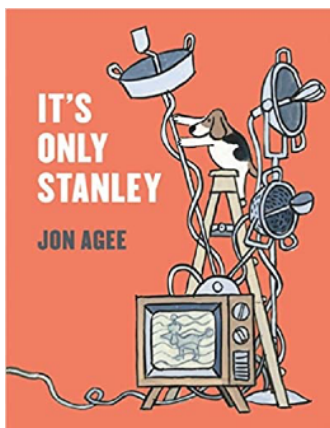
This Book Just Ate My Dog! by Richard Byrne

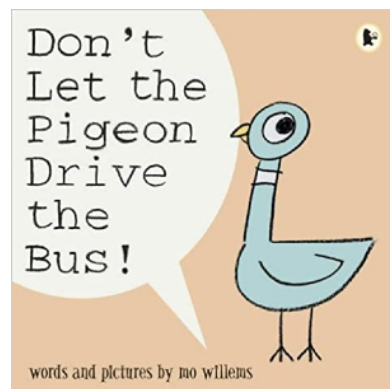
It's Only Stanley by Jon Agee



Mysterious noises keep waking up the Wimbledon family. That's very odd, says Mr. Wimbledon each time, but when he returns from checking on the sounds, he's always reassuring: It's only Stanley; he's fixing the oil tank. It's only Stanley; he's clearing the bathtub drain.

But what Stanley the dog is actually doing while his oblivious family goes back to bed is deliciously absurd: he's turning the house into a rocket ship to zoom himself and his family to another planet for an alien encounter. This is a perfect rhyming read-aloud for fans of irreverent tales like Click Clack Moo and I Want My Hat Back.

Don't Let the Pidgeon Drive the Bus! by Mo Willems



When a bus driver takes a break in this hilarious Caldecott Honour-winning picture book, he gives the reader just one instruction: "Don't let the pigeon drive the bus!" But, boy, that pigeon tries every trick in the book to get in that driving seat: he whines, wheedles, fibs and flatters. Will you let him drive?

Told entirely in speech bubbles, this brilliantly original and funny picture book demands audience participation!

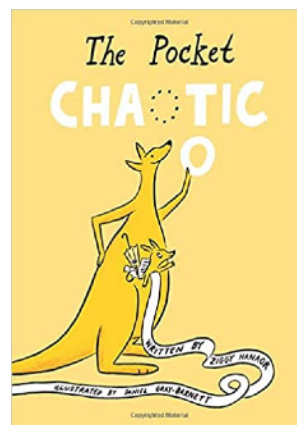
Tell Tail by C. K. Smouha



Dex is a dog with an unruly tail. All the other members of Dex's family are tough as nails, but Dex is cut from a different cloth. He likes to chat and play, and when he does, his tail wags wildly. When he's sad, his tail tucks under. Everyone can see exactly how he's feeling. The rest of Dex's family find it very embarrassing, so Dex tries to rein his tail in - to no avail.

Dex runs and runs and runs, until he stops caring - about his tail - about anything. When Dad finds him, his tail is completely still. It doesn't wag, it doesn't tuck under. It's just there. After a couple weeks, Dad starts to feel uncomfortable. What could be wrong with Dex? With a little bit of help from Bailey, Dex and Dad go on a journey to rediscover the joys of self expression.

The Pocket Chaotic by Ziggy Hanaor

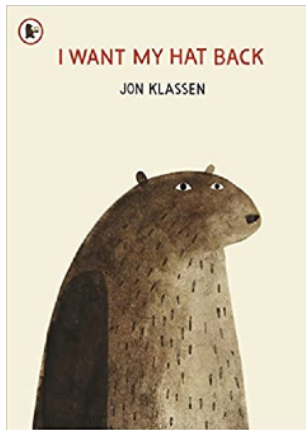

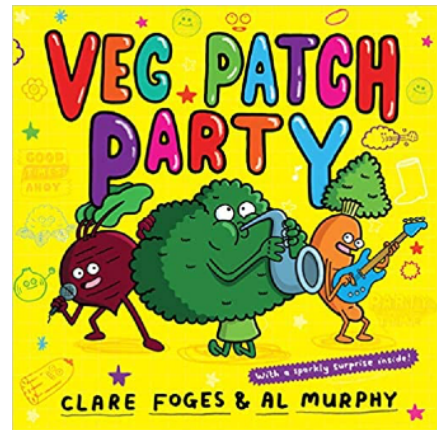
I Want My Hat Back by Jon Klassen

Told completely in dialogue, this delicious take on the classic repetitive tale plays out in sly illustrations laced with visual humour-- and winks at the reader with a wry irreverence that will have kids of all ages thrilled to be in on the joke.

The Bookworm by Debi Gliori

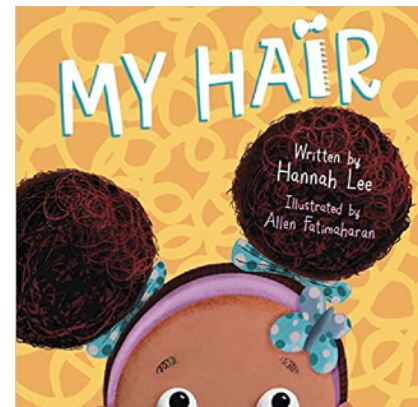

Oof Makes an Ouch! By Duncan Beedie

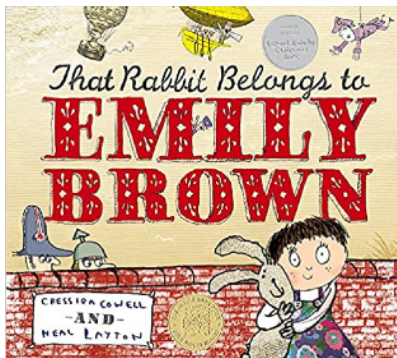

We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen

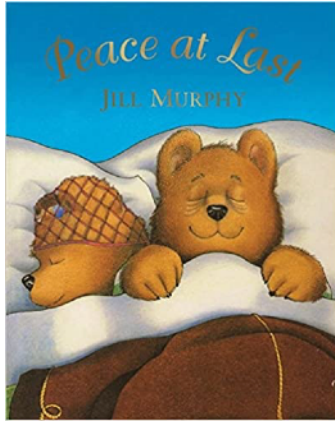

The hour was late and Mr Bear was tired. But he could not sleep - however he tried and wherever he tried.

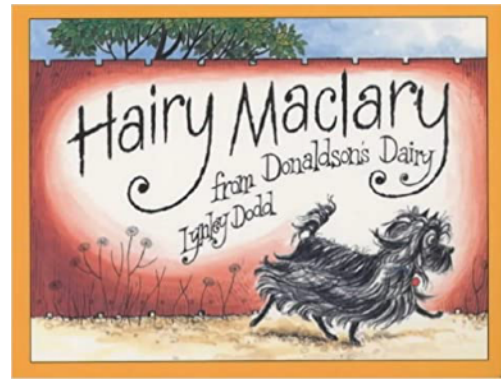
SNORE, SNORE went Mrs Bear.

Meg and Mog by Helen Nicoll



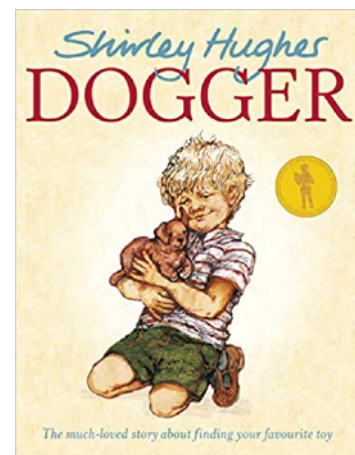
Meg and Mog are off to a wild Hallowe'en party with all the other witches!

Dogger by Shirley Hughes



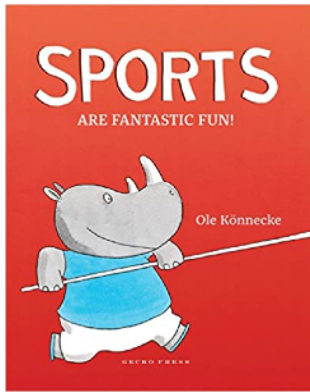

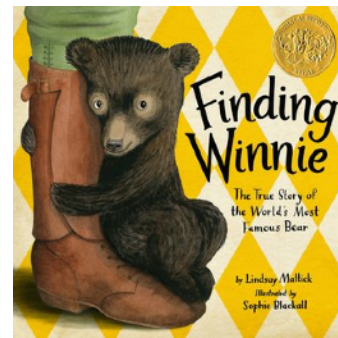
Sports Are Fantastic Fun! By Ole Könnecke

Sports lovers small and big will find the one they love best--and some surprises--in this witty picture book, presented with charming characters and laconic commentary.

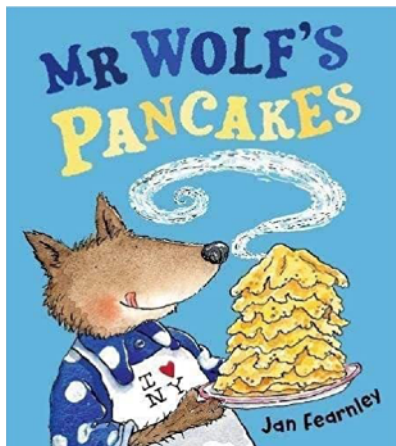
Finding Winnie: The True Story of the World's Most Famous Bear by Lindsay Mattick

Clean up! by Nathan Bryon

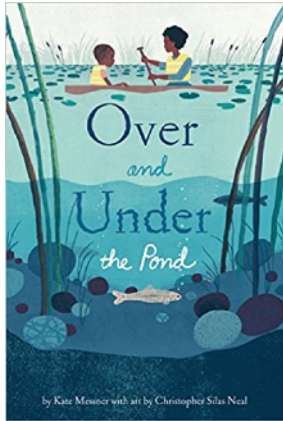

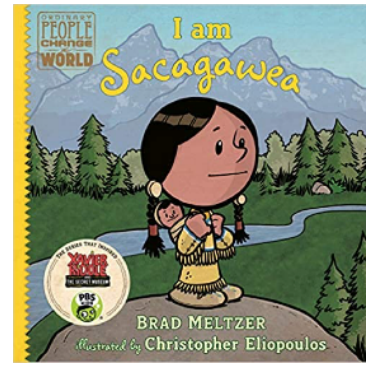
Over and Under the Pond by Kate Messner



As parent and child launch a canoe from the muddy shore and paddle through water lilies, they see frogs jump and painted turtles slide off logs, disappearing beneath the murky water. What's happening down there? Under the pond, leeches lurk, crayfish scuttle under rocks, nymphs build intricate shells, and microscopic animals break down fallen leaves to recharge the water with nutrients. Over the pond, fuzzy cattails sway in the breeze, and a pair of loons swim by, laughing in the dappled sunlight.

A follow up to 'Over and Under the Snow' and 'Up in the Garden and Down in the Dirt', this time focusing on the rich, interconnected ecosystem of a mountain pond.

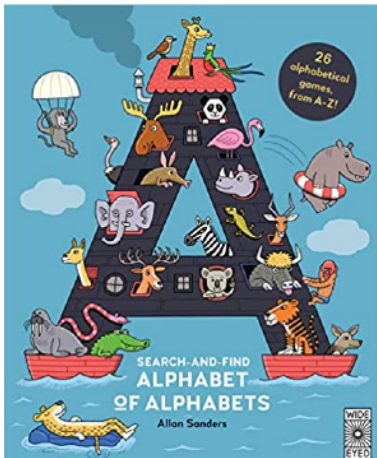
I am Sacagawea by Brad Meltzer



Sacagawea was the only girl, and the only Native American, to join Lewis and Clark's Corps of Discovery, which explored the United States from the Mississippi River all the way to the Pacific Ocean in the early 1800s. As a translator, she helped the team communicate with members of the Shoshone tribe across the continent, carrying her child on her back the whole way. By the time the expedition arrived at the west coast, Sacagawea had proved that she truly was a trailblazer.

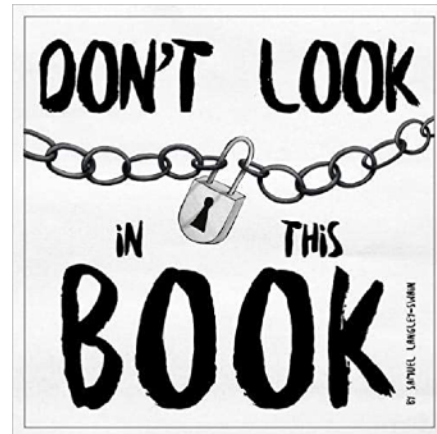

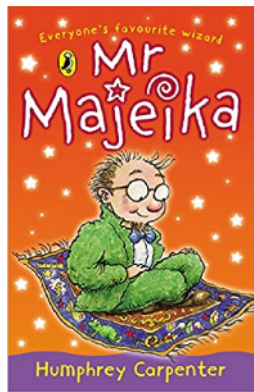
Don't Look In This Book by Samuel Langley-Swain

And to everyone's delight it looks as if Hamish will have to remain a frog because Mr Majeika can't remember the spell to turn him back again! With Mr Majeika in charge, suddenly life at school become much more exciting – there's even a magic-carpet ride to Buckingham Palace!

This book has a sequel- 'Guinea Pig Superstar'.

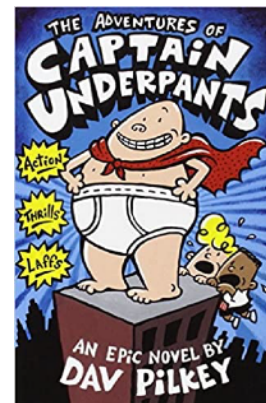
The Lost Homework by Richard O'Neill

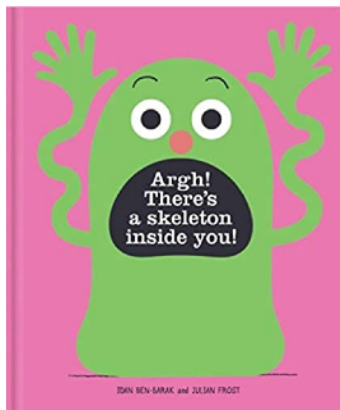
Sofia Valdez, Future Prez by Andrea Beaty

This book is part of the 'Questioners' series.

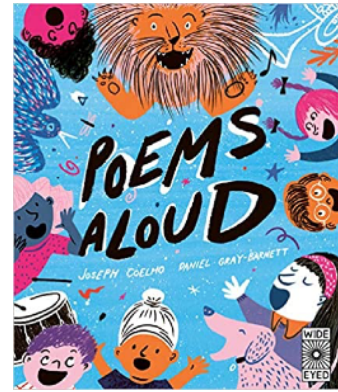
Argh! There's a Skeleton Inside You! by Idan Ben-Barak

An interstellar exploration of hands and what's inside them, from the award-winning creators of the internationally successful *Do Not Lick This Book*.

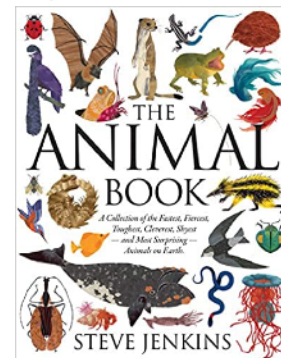
Poems Aloud by Joseph Coelho
